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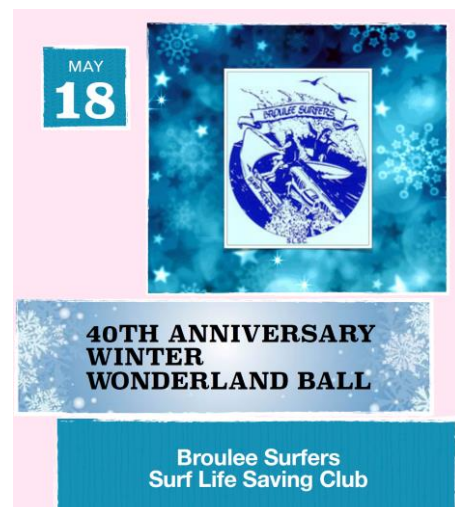

PRESIDENTS REPORT 2018-2019

The 2018-2019 year has been another very successful season for our club. The Club managed to successfully meet our patrolling commitments, run a successful nippers programme, be successful in surf sports and have a good time whilst doing all these activities.

The club also celebrated its 40th anniversary. Celebrations were held on the 17th and 18th of May. Many of the original members and their supporters were able to attend the celebrations and the tales of their trials and efforts in setting up the club were great to hear. It was also important to recognise the role of the Broulee Board Riders in establishing our Club. This is where the Broulee Surfers SLSC name comes from.



Patrols

This year we had 175 patrolling members. Over 25,000 people visited our beach during our patrolling hours. Our members conducted 187 preventative actions, 18 rescues, 30 first aids and 12 marine stings. Fortunately, we were again fatality free for another year. In addition to rostered patrols, several emergency call outs were also responded to. I thank all patrollers for freely giving their time, skill and knowledge. I also thank them for the professional manner in which they have all conducted themselves whilst on patrol. It is important to note that 34 members attained 100% patroller status this year. This included several who have attained greater than 5 years as 100% patrollers.

Membership

We continue to be a very big club. We have a total of 639 members which includes 175 patrolling members and 259 Nippers. We are fortunate that our Canberra based membership continues to grow and their contributions to all aspects of our club are significant and much appreciated. I think the distinction between Canberra based and locally based members has become less and we operate as one united, cohesive unit.

Trainers and Assessors

Trainers and assessors are responsible for annual proficiencies and the delivery of new awards to our members. Without these people, the club would simply not have people capable of patrolling our beach. There were 638 proficiencies which included 122 bronze medallion proficiencies and 339 Nipper swims. There were 593 new awards which included 238 age awards, 54 coach and official units, 13 new Bronze medallions and 12 SRCs. We also had 12 IRB crew and 9 IRB driver new awards. The Club thanks Mick Lambert, Peter Halpin, Gary Pettigrove and James Flick for their hard work and professionalism.

Nippers

It has been great seeing our Nippers on the beach with parents, water safety and age managers. Everyone seems to have a great time and the skills both on the sand and in the water are fantastic. Many nippers have better skills than many of our older members. Scott and Simone Elliott have been our Nipper coordinators for many years and have run the program with great skill and success. They always seemed calm and in complete control. The club thanks them for the huge effort they have put into our Nippers. They have now passed on this role to Jason Domeny who is doing a great job. I would also thank Steve Corcoran and his committee who have continued to successfully coordinate the Canberra Broulee Nippers group.





Surf Sports

It might be a bit early, but I think our club may have got the Branch silverware back. The Jack Beale trophy for seniors and the Dave Pheeney Trophy for the Nippers hopefully will



be in our cabinet after June. It was great to see so many Broulee caps at the recent Branch carnival held on our beach. It showed a big commitment by many of the members.

In addition, the Canberra based rowers had a great year. The Capitals women gained gold in the 120 category and the Vets gold in the 160s. The open women's crew won the South Coast Boat Series as did the Vets men's crew and Vets women's crew. At the ASRL the Vets women won silver and at Aussies masters the Vet women came 4th. At FSC branch championships The Capitals open women were first, The Vets women first and the Vet men were second.

Hotondo Homes Bay to Breakers Ocean Swim

The eighth annual ocean swim attracted a record number of 413 entries. The event had perfect conditions and it was a great success. It is an important event as it is a major fund raiser, a great community event and it also allows the club to work in conjunction with the local community association. Many thanks to the organising committee once again ably chaired by Gary

Pettigrove. Thanks also go to Hotondo Homes and Darren Phillips for their continued support of the event.

Sunday Swim

The summer Sunday swim series was again popular and successful. It was well supported with a large number of participants all competing strongly. Cherise Walker once again was the time keeper, handicapper and organiser. Again she has done a great job.

Grants and extensions

Once again the club was successful in gaining a Surf Clubs Facility Grant for \$350,000. This will enable the stage 2 extension to commence. We were also successful in a \$4,000 Department of Family and Housing Grant to properly fit out our new office. Our grant writer Claire Forbes and Wendy Law are to be congratulated for their successful application writing.



Club Committee

A successful club is the result of dedicated members and also a strong committee. They take responsibility for various aspects of the club's running and also contribute to overall decision making. They all contribute knowledge, wisdom and many hours of hard work. I wish to thank all members and acknowledge their contributions.

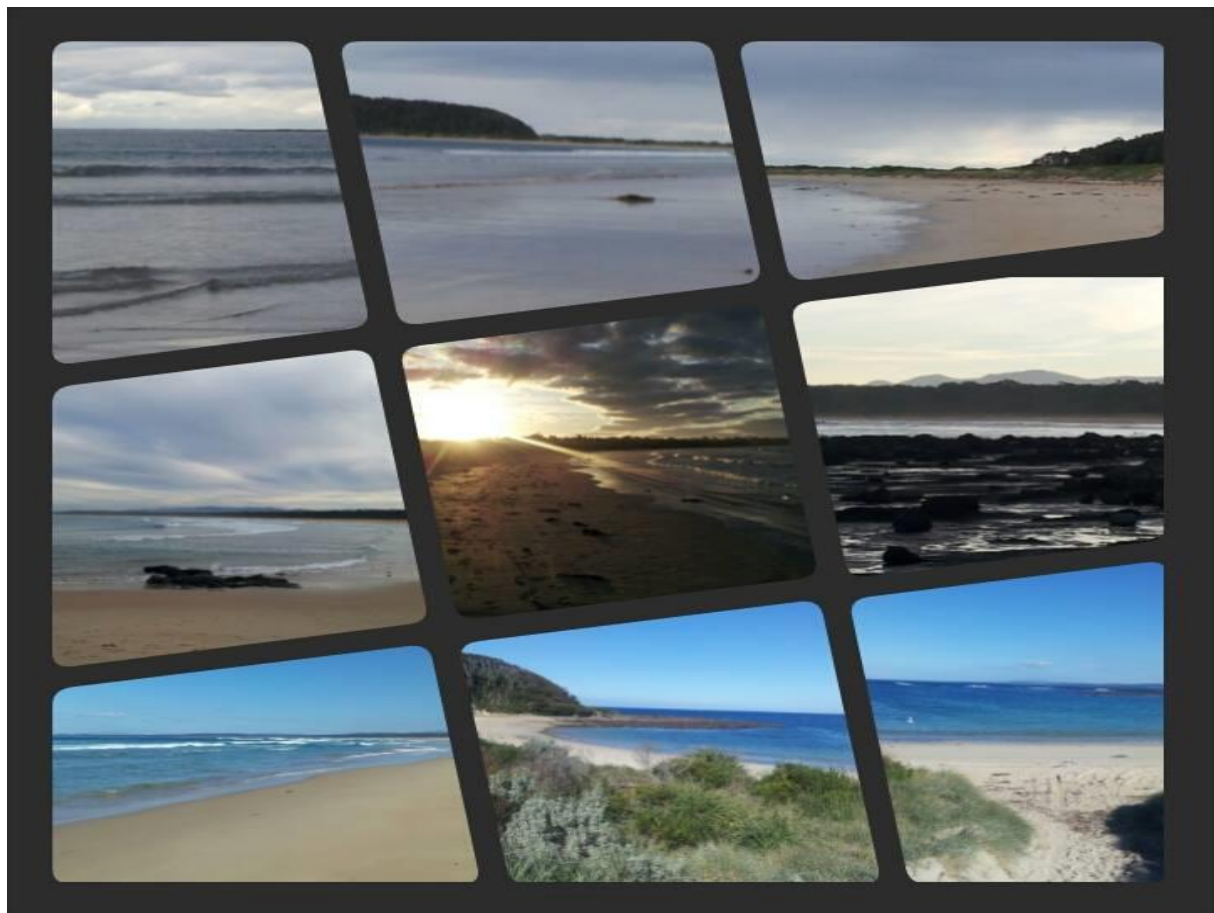

Scott, Simone and the three junior Elliott's have made an enormous contribution to running of the Broulee Nippers Program over the past 6 years. Simone and Scott have passed the baton on to Jason Domeny for the 2019/20 season, with the support of the Broulee Nippers. Thank you to the Elliott's for the many years of continual

dedication and focus on the Juniors of Broulee Nippers becoming the best they can be. Big Boots!

Broulee Nippers this year had a fully committed team of coaches we like to call Age managers and water safety. A high commendation to each and every one of these people who not only volunteer their time each week, but perform such an important role within the BSSLSC, equal to that of a community service role. Branch Carnivals

There were many participants in the Bermagui carnival in the first carnival of the season, and many also from the Canberra/Broulee Nippers braving the expected imminent weather conditions forecast. The day's event flowed fast and seamlessly at first, and the beach had provided a challenging shore break keeping the water competitors

challenged in the swims and boards. Unfortunately, the forecasted big weather front arrived and with some pre-warning, the teams evacuated the beach

promptly and with many thanks to the Broulee parents and team for the pack down. Early stop to the Narooma Ice creamery on the way home.

The second Branch carnival in Tathra did not disappoint. Textbook conditions, 2-3foot surf, an inshore gutter and gentle rips either side of the sand bank. Two water areas functioning challenged the water participants either side of the bank. A credible turnout for all the Broulee crew, and the 35 Nippers really took the challenge head on.



Two U14 and two U13 competitors meant some strong relay teams in the all age beach events, and also the board relays. Some standout performances in all age groups kept the spectators gasping on the shoreline, nosedives to body surf recoveries in board

events noted in the U14s. Take the rips, or take on the sandbank was the choice for the board competitors, whereas the swimmers either way had to contest the north to south current beyond the banks to make the journey around the buoys in the 300m swim legs and board rescues.

A huge effort recognised for the U9s opting out of the Wade event and choosing the swim instead - well done Broulee U9s. So many individual and team performances worthy of recognition, the entire Broulee team sure did themselves proud. Not forgetting of course, the U8s, with the fastest legs on the beach to tag in the



competitors in the Junior board (U8, U9, U10) relay event as a last minute inclusion. Broulee sure stood out in the March past, as we entered into the rink, and we then looked forward the hometown advantage in three weeks' time. Thanks Tathra for hosting a spectacular event, very smooth indeed.

The final Branch carnival on home sand saw conditions again textbook like conditions for hosting a carnival at South Broulee, 21 degree water temperature, light winds and an incoming tide. With that, the water areas for the Junior carnival were set up either side of the southern bank, and rips were working in the 2 foot swell at both sides of the bank. There was a strong north to south current beyond the sand bank, which for those who swam the string used to their benefit. The board paddlers had the choice of running the bank



and take on the waves, or going hard into the rip and catch the express train to the cans! It really became both tactical and skilful for the competitors taking on the water events, and the spectators fully appreciated the efforts of all the participating clubs' Nippers.

Broulee was strong on the day, with multiple teams in most events, and two very smart looking March Past teams. The beach flags events attracted the usual "oohs and ahhs" from the nail biters behind the fence, and it was truly deafening amongst the cheering for the age relays and all age relays. Anyone would have thought it was tight for points! Broulee entered 98 competitors in total across all ages (49 from Broulee and 49 from Canberra), which sure packed the carnival tents to capacity. The Age managers sure had their teams full and well in control, and the Officials on the day handled the multiple busy heats extremely well.

Water safety were tremendous in the rips and on the banks, there was never a time to simply stand and watch as the rips kept them on the move. There was tremendous positive on-field experience and encouragement for all the participants.

State Championships, **Interbranch and Sydney Water**

Sydney Water Series was held in November 2018 – Luke and Erin Drewsen and Lara Elliot competed and represented Broulee exceptionally well. Luke came 4th overall in the 10 yr boys and Lara came 3rd overall in the 10 yr girls.



Interbranch was held in December 2018 at Black Head SLSC near Forster and Skye Wildman was selected to compete for our FSC team.

The Country Championships was held in Feb 2019 at Cudgen Headlands – Luke came an impressive 4th in U11 flags and 2nd in sprint. Erin progressed through 3 rounds of flags and one round of sprints. Skye made final in flags and came 5th, 18th in surf swim and competed strongly in the 1km beach run.

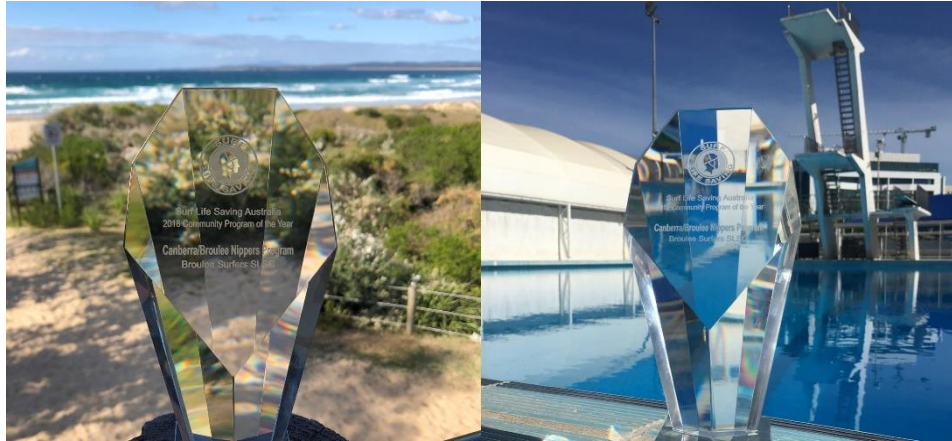

The 2018-19 season was a great year, both 'on and off the field' for the Club's Canberra/Broulee Nippers (CBN) program.

The Club was awarded the SLS NSW State award and SLISA National Education Award for Community Program of the Year.

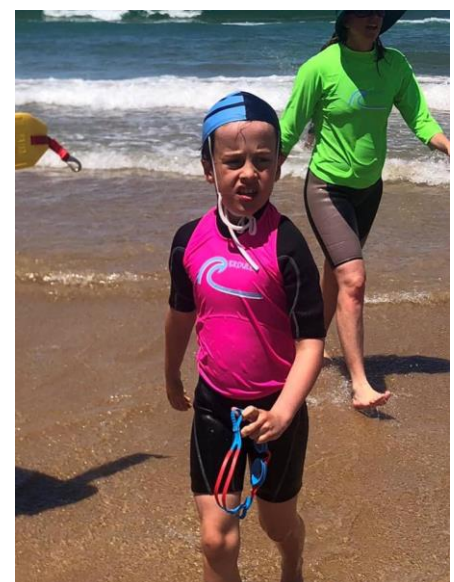
This was a valuable addition to the program, to put the training into practice and to gain patrol experience.

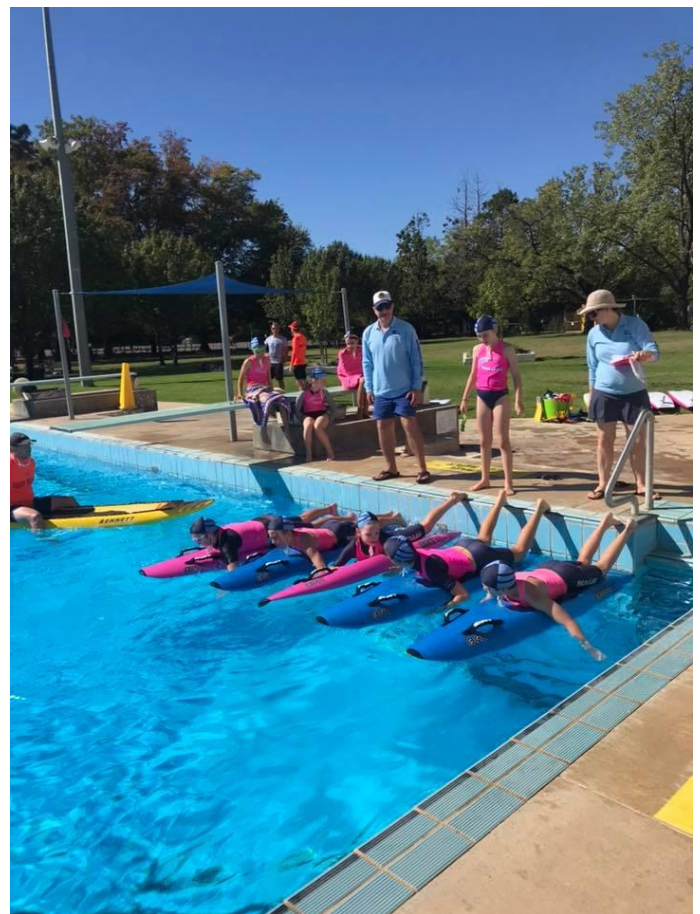
Far South Coast branch medals

HOTONDO HOMES BROULEE BAY TO BREAKERS OCEAN SWIM

EVENT REPORT 2019

The eighth annual Broulee Bay to Breakers Ocean Swim was conducted on Sunday 10 March 2019. A successful day was held by all and an increased participation to 413 swimmers and the improved environmental profile was excellent.

The conditions were perfect for ocean swimming with a small wave which made it easier for most swimmers to complete the course. The water was very clear and warmest ever at 21.5C. The swim was over the normal course. The weather conditions were perfect at 28C, warm and no wind. There were 413 swimmers that entered the water and completed the swim. The preregistration was 378 and the walk-up registrations on the day was 35 swimmers.

The fourth year of the Under 12 and 14 swim over 500m was conducted which had 30 swimmers which was three down on last year's swim.

The event was sponsored by Hotondo Homes (Principal Darren Phillips) as the major sponsor and we were supported by a larger number of local sponsors. Hotondo Homes are in the first of their third three-year major sponsorship agreement and seventh year overall.

This year we also supported a charity (Make A Wish Foundation) and together with Hotondo's huge promotional and fundraising efforts, together we raised over \$8200 for Make-A-Wish. Well done Hotondo team.

The organising committee were members from the Broulee Surfers Surf Life Saving Club and the Broulee Mossy Point Community Association. The Swim committee all did a fantastic job applying better practice and the lessons learnt from the previous swims to make this a better event.

The swimmer's feedback was good this year although we had some major issues with the presentation and getting the right results on paper to hand out the prizes to the correct swimmers.

A profit was made from the event and the allocation of funds split (\$10,000) between the Broulee Surf Life Saving Club and the Broulee Mossy Point Community Association. The whole Broulee community were the winners on the day.

James Thorp won his first Open Men's Swim and Grace Hoytink won her first open Women's swim. Both winners are swimmers from Canberra.

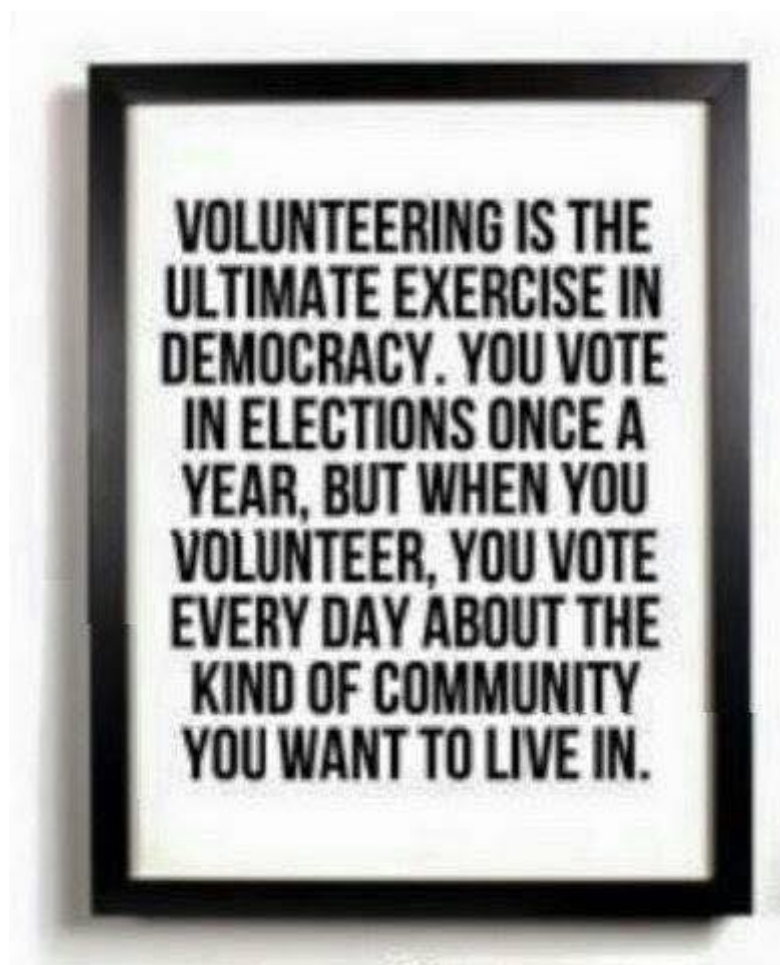

1 Summary of significant accounting policies

The association was incorporated 21 October 1988 (Y0616534) under the *Associations Incorporation Act 2009*, NSW. It is registered with the Australian Business Register - Australian Business Number 62 456 466 445. The association is registered for Goods and Services Tax purposes and reports quarterly on a cash basis. The association is income tax exempt under authority from the Australian Taxation Office. It holds an authority to fundraise through Surf Life Saving New South Wales Incorporated (CFN11033) under the provisions of the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 and the authority remains in force until 6 May 2019.

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act 2009* as above and *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report:

(a) Property, plant and equipment

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Donated assets are brought to account at fair value at the date of acquisition.

(b) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in-first-out basis and is net of any rebates and discounts received. Net realisable value is estimated using the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date and inventory is written down through an obsolescence provision if necessary.

2 Information And Declarations to be furnished under the *Charitable Fundraising Act 1991*

During the year the organisation obtained net income of \$58,870.78 for charitable purposes. Of this income \$1,503.63 was used for fundraising expenses. The surplus was used for equipment purchases and maintenance. Fundraising efforts conducted included sponsorship and donations, various functions and product sales.
